

City of Immigrants: An American Story An Exhibit Showing at the Napa County Historical Society October 13, 2023 through March 30, 2024 The Napa Historical Society's new exhibit "City of Immigrants: An American Story" explores the many waves of immigration into the Napa Valley during the 100 years from 1820 to 1920. These waves of immigration created a rich tapestry of ethnicities and cultural blending. The period is examined thematically through cuisine, community organizations, religious celebrations, leisure activities, place names, and skills and technology. These topics are illustrated by photos, news articles, statistical charts, and objects on display that relate to the themes. A timeline in the entry hall adds context by associating Napa Valley events with world events. In the course of several weeks of meetings, planning participants had an opportunity to watch Historical Society staff develop the exhibit from bare walls to a rich display of information and artifacts, a feast for eyes and mind. The Napa Valley Genealogical Society worked in partnership with the Napa Historical Society and many other local stakeholders to add depth to this exhibit. Four Napa pioneers, researched by NVGS volunteers Sue Ziemski and Linda Jesmok, highlight the kind of documentation that can illuminate the lives of our own ancestors and enhance our understanding of history.

The Napa Historical Society is located at 1219 First St., Napa, and is open Tues/Weds/Thurs 10 AM-3 PM and Fri-Sat 10 AM-5 PM. A sister exhibit will be displayed at the St. Helena Historical Society, located at 1255 Oak Ave., St. Helena, beginning in November. Call 707-967-5502 for additional information. Visit the exhibits at both venues through March 30, 2024. No charge for admission, although donations are welcomed.

DNA: The Building Blocks of Life

When you first look at your DNA results, you might be surprised, particularly if you compare your results to a sibling. After all, if the two of you have the same parents, then your DNA should be pretty close. Right? Not necessarily!

You probably already know that you inherit half of your DNA from your father and half from your mother. But your DNA carries so much information that there can be a lot of variation in what gets passed on. Let's try looking at it in a different way and use names and letters as a metaphor for the DNA that family members share.



Imagine someone whose DNA "name" is ANDREW. When he and his wife, SANDRA, have children, he can only pass on half of that name to each child. In one son's case, we'll say he passes on the D, the E, and the W. SANDRA passes on the letters, A, D, and R and those six letters combine to give their son the genetic "name", EDWARD.

Meanwhile, another couple, GRAHAM and ELAINE, have a daughter named ANGELA. She inherited the G and two As in her name from her father and the E, L, and N from her mother.

Now let's take this a step further. A few years down the line, EDWARD and ANGELA get married and have kids of their own. Their DNA mixes to produce three children.



What is interesting is that even though all three of these children have the same two parents and the same four grandparents, the DNA they inherited is distinct. Some information (letters) show up in each child but other pieces are nowhere to be found.



Of course, actual DNA is much more complex than this example. Here we're just looking at six-letter names, while the DNA that is tested to make up your "genetic name" has hundreds of thousands of letters. That's why testing many people in your family can be helpful. Your father's results might show an ethnicity that yours did not. Your sister's results might connect you to even more cousins. By looking at your DNA results alongside your family's, you can achieve a more complete view of your genetic history.

LIBRARY HAPPENINGS

Garden Gurus from our volunteer members have worked out a collarboration with a few wonderful Napa Master Gardeners to provide assistance and guidance in improving the Library's outdoor landscaping area and ensuring the long-term health of the plantings.

The goals we want to accomplish are:

- Prepare the California Blvd. side of the Library with cardboard and compost so that drought-tolerant native plants can be planted alongside existing healthy plants.
- Repair and refurbish the irrigation system; either by re-working and using what is already in place, or replacing with new parts as needed.
- The last immediate goal is to plant our new native plants and provide drip irrigation where needed.

To date, our first goal has been accomplished. One of the Master Gardener experts is currently being scheduled to come to the Library to problem solve and repair our irrigation system which has not worked for years. Many have tried to fix it, to no avail, but this individual is well-versed in electrical issues as well as irrigation problem solving. (Shout out to Bente Shoar for all the hand watering and gardening chores she has done for years -THANK YOU!) Three other Master Gardener volunteers are planning the native plants to purchase as soon as irrigation work is complete to be put into the area along California Blvd. that has been prepped. The timeline for this to be done is by the middle of November.

After planting, next steps will be to prune as necessary for winter and wait for the new plants to emerge with color alongside existing plants on California Blvd.

Beyond these goals, we do need ongoing assistance to help the Garden Gurus with the usual gardening chores such as cleaning up debris, pruning plants, weeding, etc. Anyone who can join us for an hour or two a month will be much appreciated! It takes a village to restore a landscape.

As we head into 2024 marking our 50th anniversary, we look forward to a rejuvenated outdoor space at the Library!
